Because of the number of students who apply, a few campuses have higher standards (supplementary admission criteria) for all applicants. Most CSU campuses have local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region. School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

Sherman Thomas Charter School stands as a testament to the district's unwavering commitment to providing a conducive learning environment for its students. With a main campus constructed in 1992 and subsequent additions in 2004, 2006, and 2023 the school boasts 11 classrooms, a multipurpose room, a library, and an administration building. Despite the age of the buildings, the district's maintenance staff diligently undertakes repairs to ensure the safety and functionality of the facilities. The maintenance teams conduct routine visits, addressing necessary repairs promptly through an efficient work order process, with emergency repairs prioritized to swiftly resolve urgent issues.

Beyond structural maintenance, the school prioritizes cleanliness and hygiene. The principal collaborates with the dedicated custodial staff to develop and implement effective cleaning procedures, maintaining a clean and safe environment for students and staff alike. This commitment to cleanliness is further reinforced through regular meetings between site administration and the head custodian, held monthly to address custodial issues comprehensively. This approach to maintenance and cleanliness underscores the district's dedication to providing Sherman Thomas Charter School students with an optimal and secure learning atmosphere.
